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Maintaining NYSUT membership in retirement is crucial, especially if you're currently participating in a NYSUT Member Benefits-endorsed program(s) and would like to continue doing so. This can be accomplished in one of two ways:

- 1 Continue membership within your local if retiree membership is offered. Contact your local to find out if any retiree membership requirements are in place. You must comply with these requirements to continue your membership in NYSUT along with the American Federation of Teachers (AFT) and National Education Association (NEA).
- 2 Continue as an at-large member of NYSUT through the Retiree Council in your region. Contact your local to ensure you will be reported as retired to NYSUT. This will provide you with membership in the Retiree Council in your region along with NYSUT, AFT, and NEA. If you have questions about maintaining NYSUT membership or would like more information about NYSUT retiree programs, you will want to contact the NYSUT Retiree Services Consultant serving your region. You can find this information at nysut.cc/retireeconsultants.

More than a dozen of the endorsed programs offered by Member Benefits can be purchased through either payroll or pension deduction. These convenient payment methods offer reduced premiums or the elimination of service fees in many instances. An active NYSUT membership is required to participate in payroll or pension deduction. If you're currently participating in one (or more) of our endorsed programs, we encourage you to look into switching to pension deduction after you enter retirement.

## **DEMYSTIFYING LONG-TERM SUSPENSION**

Long-term suspension often comes with a lot of stereotypes about our students. Some may hold a bit of truth, but more often than not, they're far from accurate.

This year, I've seen students come and go—but more importantly, I've seen many grow. I've watched them form friendships with people they may never have spoken to before. I've seen one student earn a Science award from their home school while here with us. I've watched others shift their mindset about special education, learning to love and appreciate every child in both our K–5 and High School programs.

So, when you think of students in long-term suspension, remember—they're still just kids. Kids who made a mistake. And yes, some may make the same or even new mistakes. # BUGS, BUGS, BUGS







Kammy Ciesielski's K-2 Special Needs class spent the month of May learning about insects! The students worked so hard. We read a lot of insect books from the Scholastic Science Vocabulary Series. These elementary students learned where insects live and that they have 3 body parts - head, thorax and abdomen. We also learned that some insects have wings, and all insects have 6 legs. The students continued their research to learn about different life cycles. We watched how a caterpillar turns into a chrysalis and changes into a butterfly. We also were able to watch how a ladybug changes from a larva to pupa, and then to an adult ladybug! These students were amazed to see the butterflies fly away and the ladybugs walk through the grass. The students worked hard all month making a lap book about what they have learned and a bug box to keep their homemade insects (made out of different materials). We also used one bug to "pollinate" the flowers during a science experiment.

Jennifer Kelley shares that conservation students managed husbandry for a small population of a New York native species the hornworms. To learn about the metamorphosis cycle, students provide nutrients and monitor temperature and humidity throughout the hornworms' life and make observations about their physical appearance to anticipate when they will pupate.

While the worms pupate, students learn about the important role of pollinators in our ecosystem and when these hornworms emerge as a sphynx moth how they will join the ecosystem to pollinate flowers.





# HEALTH CAREERS FIELD TRIP

Jonnie O'Connor's juniors and seniors were guests on all day Health Careers field trip. The 23 students from Ken Ton's Certified Nursing Assistant Program were given a tour of both Buffalo Surgical Center and Excelsior Orthopaedics. They had several hands-on activities such as Physical Therapy, Surgical Prep, and How Xray Works. Many of our students were casted—what a lasting impression!









Staff visited to talk about their careers and opportunities for professional and entry level careers at Excelsior and were highly impressed with our students. "The students were incredibly engaged, asked thoughtful questions, and showed a genuine interest in learning more about the healthcare field. It was a great opportunity to share the work we do here at Excelsior/BSC and hopefully inspire the next generation of healthcare professionals."

Senior Baking & Pastry and Culinary Arts students from the Potter Career & Technical Center donated \$500 to Hospice Buffalo.



## SAVING WILDLIFE BY HELPING PEOPLE

Hannah Wiegand's Zoo, Wildlife, and Conservation Careers class learned about the importance of community in wildlife conservation from National Geographic Explorer and Primatologist Dr. Rebecca Smith. She's working to save capuchin monkeys and their disappearing Atlantic Forest ecosystem in Paraguay. One of the communities she works closely with is the Mberu Pirapo'i indigenous school in the San Rafael region. A quote from their website states, "The rural and indigenous communities around San Rafael have historically been neglected. We recognise that neither successful learning nor enthusiasm for conservation are possible if basic needs aren't met. Therefore, we regularly organise and engage in fundraisers for the communities."









The ZWCC class had the opportunity to participate in a Zoom seminar with Dr. Smith and organized a winter clothing drive to send winter clothing to Paraguay. The lesson for the students was simple - in order to help wildlife, we need to help people first! If these kids are cold or hungry they are not in the right mindset to learn or care about the environment. This was a personal connection for me as well because the students receiving the clothing donations are the same students that I spent time with last summer while studying with Dr. Smith in Paraguay. With the support of Erie 1 BOCES, we sent two boxes of clothes that my students collected all the way to Paraguay in time to keep the kids warm this winter! (Our summer is their winter!) This was a new endeavor for the ZWCC program and I'm so excited to be forging global conservation connections with my students.


